MAFA Joins the Mount Athos Center to Produce an English Translation of the Mount Athos Panagion



In 2013 The Mount Athos Center (Agioireitiki Estia) published its spectacular 415-page volume, *Hagioreit Panagion. The Chorus of the Saints on Athos*, under the editorship of the respected and internationally recognized scholar, Symeon A. Paschalidis (<https://www.agioritikiestia.gr/en/hagioreitikon-panagion-ton-en-atho-ho-choros>). The above image (pages 52-53) shows the beginning of the life of Athanasios the Athonite, founder of the Great Lavra Monastery († 1001/4), illustrated by the icon of Athanasios from the wall of the Protaton church attributed to the painter, Manuel Panselinos. It illustrates the quality and sumptuousness of this volume. Now MAFA and the Mount Athos Center have entered into a partnership to produce an English translation. We have already read the pilot project, a translation of the same life of St. Athanasios the Athonite by Andrew Philip Hendry. The translation is beautifully done, in language that is flowing and inspirational and at the same time does full justice to the beauty of the original.

The project's total cost for MAFA is €10,000 (\$11,875) spread over the three year period during which time the translation will be produced. We are pleased to announce that we have contributed our first instalment and the project has begun. We look forward enthusiastically to its completion in 2023/24.

Update on Grigoriou Monastery Fire Recovery

In the first half of this year, we made our second contribution, making good use of our emergency aid fund. MAFA Supports the sisters of the Holy Convent of St. John the Forerunner

Located high on Mt. Kissavos (a.k.a. Mt. Ossa) in central Greece, this monastery was founded by the blessed martyr St Damianos (of Philotheou Monastery, Mt Athos) in the 16th century. After the last monk of the original monastery died in 1889, the local village of Anatoli took care of it until monks from Karakalou Monastery of Mt Athos came in 1981 and began to build a new structure next to the old monastery. Unfortunately, the monks from Karakalou left in 1985, unable to finish the new building.

In 2000, a group of determined and intrepid sisters from the Holy Monastery of Saint Paul the Apostle (<https://www.saintpauls-monastery.gr/en/home-2/>), located on the southeastern tip of the Attic peninsula), under the guidance of Fr. Dositheos Andrianopoulos (of Dionysiou Monastery, Mt. Athos) took possession of now abandoned and deteriorating monastery. Under the energetic and charismatic leadership of igumen (abbess) Mother Theodekti, who is well known to the Friends of Mount Athos, the sisters brought renewed vigor to its rehabilitation.

Sister Theoktiste, assistant to Mother Theodekti, informs MAFA that "Our greatest longing from a materialistic standpoint has been keeping the old monastery from ruin and restoring its church together with its precious frescoes from the 16th century. By the grace of God and help of others, we were able to accomplish this a few years ago, but it has drained our finances, as well as any funds from our relatives and friends." However, the monastery now has a pressing need. The vibrancy of this sisterhood has attracted new sisters, who are much appreciated because they are needed to sustain the Convent into the future. The problem is, there are no cells for the new sisters, who are having to double up in existing cells and crowd into any available nook or cranny in the existing buildings.

Members of the Friends of Mount Athos who have met Mother Theodekti or participated in the recent FoMA zoom session with her will understand her charisma and how she inspired the sisters to succeed where the monks had failed. Here is her description of the community of sisters:

What makes our community special, apart from our simplicity and devotion as Orthodox monastics, is our multi ethnicity and involvement in organic farming. Having sisters from 13 different countries means we can converse in Arabic, Armenian, Chinese, English, Estonian, Finnish, French, German, Greek, Italian, Japanese, Persian and Russian. This makes it possible for us to welcome guests from all over the world. Our community has also helped teach other monastic communities in Greece how to start up and run an organic farm. In addition, we participate in the World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms of Greece (WOOFG, <https://woof.gr/>). It is part of a worldwide movement linking visitors with organic farmers to promote cultural and educational experiences based on trust and non-monetary exchange. We are also active in Peliti (Πελίτι, <https://peliti.gr/>), an organization for the preservation and distribution of traditional seeds.

Those of us on the MAFA Board of Directors who share connections to the American Farm School outside of Thessaloniki especially appreciate the significance of this work. The mission of the sisters of the Prodromos Convent is an inspiring complement to the far-sighted and groundbreaking work of the Farm School, now serving a new region in Greece while preserving a historic 16th-century monastery.

MAFA SCHOLARSHIPS

MAFA is pleased to announce its first 2021 scholarship: to Professor Kostis Smyrlis (Ph.D., the Sorbonne), a researcher for the National Hellenic Research Foundation in Athens (<http://www.eie.gr>) and the Centre Nationale de la Recherche Scientifique in Paris (<http://www.cnrs.fr>). We are especially appreciative of our partnership with **The Mount Athos Center in Thessaloniki**, which provides invaluable support for our scholarship winners, assuring the best chance for success of their projects.

Prof. Smyrlis is the head of a four-person team of scholars working on the edition of the archival documents of the Holy Monastery of Zographou as part of the *Archives de l'Athos* series. Each volume in this series includes an extensive introduction dealing with the history of a monastery and the topography of its territorial holdings during the medieval period. The team directed by Prof. Smyrlis is conducting a survey of the areas where the Zographou Monastery held landed property, namely the Athonite peninsula, various locations in Halkidiki, and the Strymon River Valley, comparing today's topographical and archeological data to the information found in the archival documents, and identifying the location of the estates, where possible. Our MAFA scholarship is funding travel and related expenses for this survey.

The publication of the medieval archival documents of the monasteries of Mount Athos in the *Archives de l'Athos* series, that began in the 1930s in Paris and continues to this day, has contributed enormously to the study of the social, economic, and religious history of the Byzantine Empire. More particularly, the accompanying studies on the landed holdings of the monasteries have been of particular importance for understanding the historical geography of the Holy Mountain and its broader area, and for studying the history of the landscape and the environment, as well as human settlement, demography and toponymics. The holdings of the monastery of Zographou, the subject of this project, are of particular importance, since they extend in areas not too well covered by previous volumes on other monasteries, for example the estuary of the Strymon river.

We wish Prof. Smyrlis every success and are honored to be able to support him in this important project.
